Oundle Bowling Club is located in the beautiful market town of Oundle in north east Northamptonshire. Like most outdoor bowling clubs, Oundle finds recruiting new members every year and maintaining their membership particularly challenging. That is why the club did not hesitate to apply to take part in BDA's Club Development Programme at the first opportunity.

Since then, in under a year and among other accomplishments, the club:

- · Recruited 17 new members in 1 season.
- · Introduced a 'Buddy' system, to ease the integration of new members.
- · Launched a Bowls2U outreach programme.
- · Made changes to the club website, improving its content and outlook.
- · Sent 3 coaches to a Working with Disabled People in Bowls module.
- · Trained 13 club volunteers through a Club Helpers Workshop.
- · Obtained an A-Star certification of its bowling green.
- · Is on the verge of obtaining a Bowls Disability Mark Status.
- · Developed closer relationships with the local community.
- · Raised a total of £1220 in aid of Sue Ryder Hospice.
- · Increased numbers of club volunteers.
- · Is at the latter stages of a major clubhouse extension grant application.
